Strengths

- Will address the inhumane treatment of immigrants.
- Will require immigration officers and facilities to be transparent and held accountable.
- Will prevent the separation of immigrant parents and children, thus resulting in families staying together while preserving their mental and emotional wellbeing.

Key Points

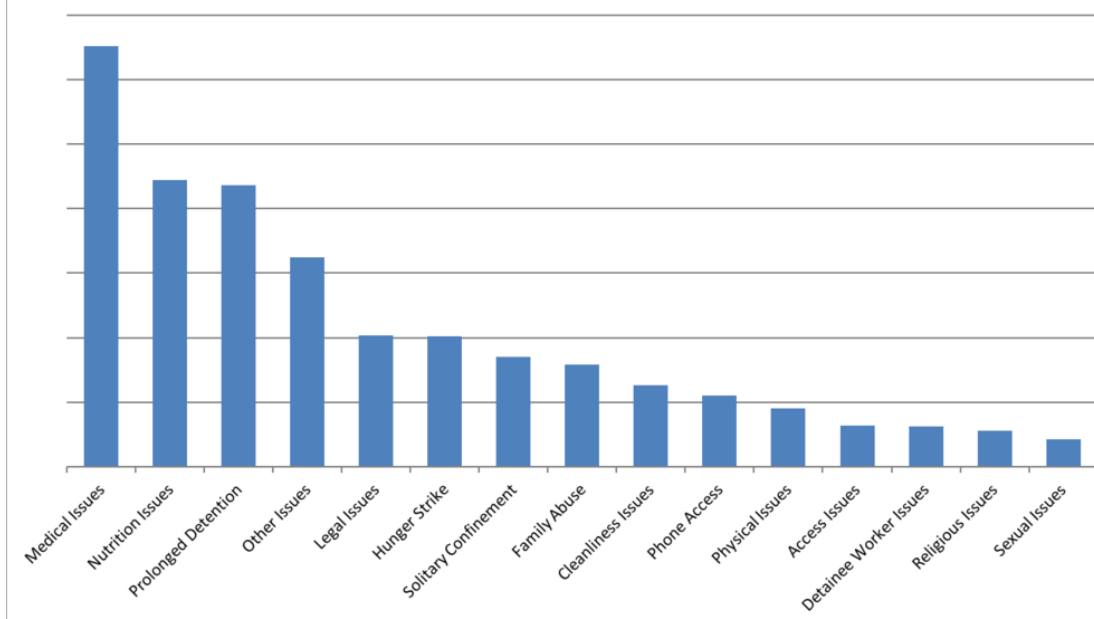
- Length of time immigrants are detained.

Freedom For Immigrants - Documented Abuses



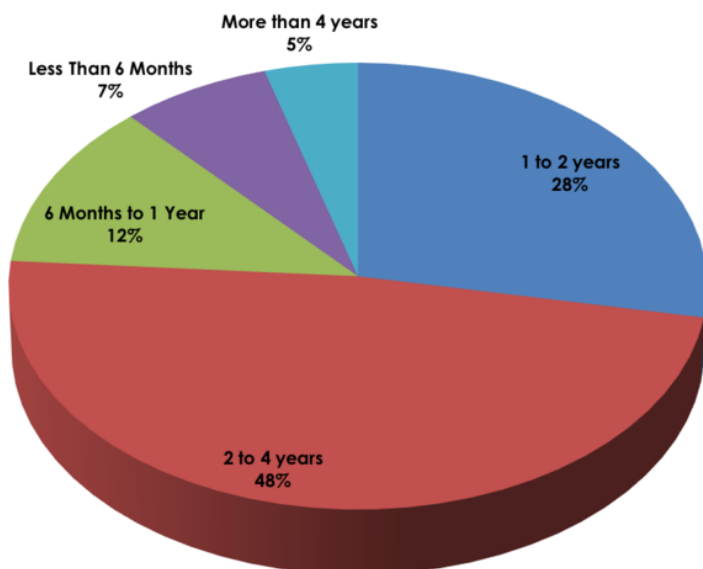
Why Should You Care?

- Dignity and worth of an individual.
- Treatment of undocumented immigrants is inhumane and unequal to how American citizens are treated.
- Movement towards immigration reform.

Recommendations

- Appoint immigrant advocates to oversee each facility and ensure immigrants are being treated fairly and humanely.
- Require translators who speak immigrant languages and dialects to be present when going over legal documents.
- Mandate unannounced monthly or bimonthly inspections.
- Discontinue the use of solitary confinement.
