### Program Learning Trips: Haiti & Kenya

This past school-year the MSW program included in its calendar two exciting trips. The first trip was to Haiti, and the other trip was to Kenya, in April and May respectively. Three different MSW students who participated shared about their experiences. Elizabeth Baker & Jaimee Daily went on the mission trip to Haiti. Their account is below:

"Every day of the trip, as our group rode out to visit with an orphanage or other agency in the community, we were greeted by the rubble left over from the earthquake and the everincreasing garbage piled up on the sides of buildings — and even in

the streets. A group of six Southern Adventist Social Work graduate students were in Haiti for one week to conduct needs assessments of six orphanages in the Port-au-Prince area.

Our purpose for being here was twofold: first to speak with the caregivers and administrators of the orphanages about how their orphanage was conducted, funded, and what needs were identified; second to interact with the children and provide therapeutic interaction time with them.

We noticed many needs: one in particular was the need to develop a system to deliver and monitor donations and their usage in the orphanages in order to eliminate misuse of donations and

to develop an international program that promotes accountability as well as continued student interaction. It is our hope that the work done on this trip will be a building block for a continued work with the Haitian people and orphans, which is empowering and lifechanging."

international program that promotes accountability as well as continued student interaction. It is our hope that the work done on this trip will be a building block for a continued work with the Haitian people and orphans, which is empowering and lifechanging."

Sarah Malcolm shares about her experience in Kenya:

"I wanted to go on the Kenya trip for the obvious reason that I needed to fulfill the requirements of practicum. I also wanted to learn more about international aid, and whether aid really is helping to address poverty. This experience has taught me more about aid and development in other counties and what needs to be done in order to make it effective.

In classes before the trip, it became evident that the church can't really afford to support its missionaries. So by combining business and social work majors, we came up with a definition of international mission and social entrepreneurship (IMSE), which uses business strategies to achieve a social goal, founded on a spiritual mission. Business and social work majors in Kenya were given opportunities to work together in social agencies to see how we could collaborate to make the agencies sustainable and more ef-
