


# What is Non-Verbal Communication and Why is it Important?

#### **Definition:**

Non-Verbal Communication, "Generally refers to eye contact, body and extremity movement, posture, facial expressions, voice tone, gestures, etc."

### Non-Verbal Communication is important because....

Accounts for 93% of all communication and can be used to repeat or re-emphasize a verbal message. It can also be used instead of verbal messages

### Latin American Culture








# Characteristics of Latin American Culture

- Tend to shake hands more often, more vigorously, and for a longer amount of time
- Less physical distance between individuals
- More frequent use of hand gestures

#### Characteristics of American Culture

- Males tend to hide or mask grief
- More physical distance between people
- Less tactile outside of familial relationships and friendships





# Asian and American Culture






### Asian vs. American

#### Asian

- considered rude to make direct eye contact with other people, especially if they are your superior.
- -he gesture used to beckon someone is a downward facing hand and then bending of the fingers
- -it is considered rude to point with one finger or one's head, and is better to use a fist and thumb if necessary

#### American


- -considered to rude to avoid eye contact
- -gesture used to call people over is to wave towards oneself or an upward facing hand and bending your finger towards yourself to call someone over.
- -Pointing is also a common gesture

# LET'S REVIEW SOME OF ASIA'S NON-VERBAL COMMUNICATION

#### China

Chinese and other
East Asian cultures
are known to place the
most emotional
importance on the
eyes when expressing
and recognizing
emotions.

#### Indonesia

Indonesians are generally quite modest with regards to physical contact. Physical affection is usually only shown between close friends and family.

#### Korea

Tend to rely less on words and are attentive to a speaker's posture to draw meaning.

#### Cambodia

The general distance between two people conversing is an arm's length. When in conversation with a friend or close acquaintance, this distance is shorter.

#### **Japan**

It is common for Japanese people to maintain a placid expression and smile during an interaction regardless of the topic.

#### **Myanma**r

The head is considered the most sacred part of a person's body and should not be touched.





# American non-verbal communications

### The South and West Coast

In parts of the United States, however, such as on the West Coast and in the South, it is quite common to glance at strangers when passing them. This type of contact doesn't mean much; it is simply a way of acknowledging another person's presence.

#### The South

Standing up when others enter a room, tipping the hat when women walk by.

#### The North

The North is depicted as having a lack of awareness of other people. The time spent in public setting is consumed by technology and their own lives, without any regard for those around them.
