I had the opportunity to interview Social Worker, Maria Malca, she has her BSW in social worker and has worked for Latino Youth High School in Chicago, Illinois for eight years. Maria Malca explained that she choose her career because she wanted to help people and because even her own religion emphasized on caring for others and treating every one equally. As a Latina herself, she was able to really relate and communicate with students that do not speak English very well.

As a Social Worker at Latino Youth High School she had experienced many different experiences with kids and families that were not of the same faith of hers. Often times, these experiences were hard to deal with. It was especially hard when I first started working, but overtime I got a little more comfortable with it. However, she mentioned that it really never is that easy, because every case is a different situation.

When Maria encountered situations like this at first she would just test the waters and she what the client was comfortable with she did not want to force any type of religion on the clients she had. As a social worker she was not suppose to. However, she would pray at home for som of her clients and their situations. She was not able to disclose a lot of information because of her position, but she did mention that she lead by example and a lot of clients and co-workers noticed the difference in her. In the agency where she was located, religion was not a major thing. Most of the population that came to her from that area and even her co-workers, did not believe in anything religious really. Because of this it was hard to share and be open about this at

first. Throughout her journey, she was able to become more comfortable, but was still careful with it. She ended up starting a support group and emphasized what would be mentioned in the support group through advertising and flyers around the school. Through this is how she was able to share the gospel and also through her own example. The kids were able to see her

Christian character through how much she cared for them. Overall, she said she had a positive outcome through her support group and kids opening up and sharing they wanted to learn more.

Plan for Future Integration of Faith and Social Work

I am a Seventh-Day Adventist and I believe it is our calling to be able to help everyone and reach out to everyone. My belief system has contributed almost completely to who I am today. My parents helped with supporting this religion and guiding me through it as a child.
