SLIDE 1 COLLEGE MAJORS

If not you do not plan on going to school, some of this content can still apply to potential career paths!

ALSO Keep in mind: Your major might change :)

SLIDE 2 Choosing a college major...

Look at your interests, values, passions, and abilities

SLIDE 3 ABILITIES

What can you do, what are you skilled at?

Math, numbers, art or musical skills, computer software, people skills

Keep in mind: Don't discount what you aren't good at yet, you have so much potential to learn! You might gain new ones.

SLIDE 4 VALUES

What are your core values?

Examples of core values: Care and desire to help people, to expand research, to discover new things, to protect nature, to contribute to your religion.

Keep in mind: Again, this does not need to be the only factor. You might change or get new ones.

SLIDE 5 INTERESTS What do you like to do? What do you enjoy talking about, participating in, what things do you find yourself asking questions about/researching?

Examples of interests: Health, sports, art, cultures, language, history, writing, reading,

Keep in mind:

These are not the only factors, interests might change, or you might get new ones!

PASSIONS

Examples of passions: Similar to interests, but much stronger and deeper. One tip: Ask people close to you for their input.

Other considerations:

-What majors does your school offer?

-Consider future implications:

-Will it interest you in years after college?

-Is it employable?

-What do careers or post-grad plans look like when taking that major into account?

Helpful tip:

Find this out by asking anyone you know in the field, searching the internet, asking your professors/college guidance office.

Other considerations:

Will it pay?

-This is not a bad question to ask yourself. -Ways you can find out about finances: (links)

Helpful tip:

As always, money should not always be your only decision, but seeking preparation about what pay to expect will benefit you in the long-run.

Other considerations:

Choosing to go broader or more specific.

-Broad: business, English, -Specific: Communicative Sciences & Disorders, Medieval Literature

Other helpful tips:

-Think of someone who is older and has gone to college and has a job/does activities you are interested in.

-Ask them what they majored in.

-Ask them if they would change that major if they are in school today.

-Meet with advisors.

-Talk to adult relatives or others for their thoughts

-Think about minors, or elective classes

Other helpful questions to ask yourself:

-What kind of job is right for me in the future as a career?
-Will this major I've chosen help me towards it?
-What college is right for me for my undergraduate studies?
-Does this college offer a great program for my chosen major?
-Does my chosen major fit my abilities, values, interests, and passions?
-Have I identified all the downsides and disadvantages of my chosen major?
