Universal Mandatory Reporting Can Help!

Current practices

Currently each state has its own laws regarding the reporting of suspected child abuse and neglect. While some states require all people to report their concerns, many states only identify specific individuals that are mandated reporters. These individuals often include social workers, medical and mental health professionals, teachers, and child care providers (Department of Health and Human Services, 2015).

Benefits of Mandatory Reporting

Counties in states with mandatory reporting laws have significantly higher rates of total and confirmed reports of abuse. Additionally, universal mandatory reporting was associated with higher rates of confirmed neglect (Paluscia & Vandervortb, 2014).
